Update on the Fire Control Tower #3 Restoration Project

In an effort to recognize veterans of World War II and all veterans who continue to serve this country in such an unselfish way, the Delaware Seashore Preservation Foundation (DSPF), in partnership with the Fort Miles Historical Association, has undertaken a capital campaign to restore Fire Control Tower #3, one of the structures that was used during the war as a first line of defense in the event of foreign invasion.

Upon its completion, Tower #3, located in the Delaware Seashore State Park just south of Dewey Beach, will serve as a place for residents and visitors to view a piece of history and honor those who served. Visitors will be able to enter the Tower via an internal stairway and access the open air deck at the top. In addition to restoring the Tower, a simulated power station will be constructed that will have a planned interactive presentation program. This electronic program, complete with displays, will allow visitors to look up a sponsored veteran's name and his/her contribution to the war effort, and learn a great deal more about the rich history of our veterans from Delaware.

The total cost for the renovation and construction project for Fire Control Tower #3 will exceed \$450,000. In order to meet the budget, the DSPF is approaching local businesses, corporations, foundations, and individuals, and hosting a variety of special fundraising events.

Once Tower #3 is restored, plans include opening it to the general public and offering interpretive tours of this historical landmark.
